So I'm often asked why, in my teaching and much of my research, I focus on environmental injustice instead of environmental justice. And in the concept of environmental justice really emerged with the emergence of the environmental justice movement, which emerged or moved into greater public visibility in the 1980s and was just a very important term in the US and global environmental movements to ask to, to to give attention to the way environmental harms were more likely to occur in communities that were otherwise also disadvantaged, because they were poor, because they were, communities of color, because of racism.
