Eight months ago, Formosa Plastic Group's chairman Y.C. Wang galvanized Calhoun and the surrounding counties with his announcement that a \$1.3

If the gargantuan project is completed according to sche-dule the nine plant complex should be finished by March 1991. should be finished. 1991. The expansion, which is the largest one-time investment by

a petrochemical company in the state's history, will create an estimated 3,000 to 4,000 construction jobs.
Currently, the non process site construction is underway, with the construction entrances and cyclone fence, 18 miles construction roads, a 72,000 square foot administration building and a 125,000

square foot warehouse soon to be constructed.

According to Bill Jones, the expansion team has grown to around 50 people, mostly engineers and administrative and the state of the state of

is completed it will cover 975 acres and employ about 1,500 workers. Included in this number are 1,300 hourly workers including lab technicians, process operators, maintenance and shipping personnel. The plant will also employ 200 salaried professionals, including administration personnel, managers and supervisors, environmental and safety personnel, along with all types of engineers, mechanical, electrical, chemical, there is an immediate need of 18-20 chemical engineers. Fueled by the petro-hemical industry_not oil and gas as in the past." Formosa is very concerned about the environment, Jones said. The plant will use the best available technology. The technology will come form all over the world, including Japan, Taiwan, Germany, Italy and the United States.

The complex will be vertically integrated with plants feeding off one another. The downstream plants will produce polyethylene and polypropylene, which are the basic building blocks for most plastic

propriene, which are the basic building blocks for most plastic products.

The complex will include a 680,000 metric ton ethane cracker, as well as plants for the production of high density polyethylene, linear-low density polyethylene, ethylene dichloride, caustic soda and chlorine.

Most of the complex's production (70 percent) will be for the world market.
